Course Description

This course will provide an overview of fintech topics and the ways in which technology is changing the landscape of financial services. Students will learn about the latest trends and developments in areas such as payments, lending, wealth management, and blockchain, and will gain an understanding of the opportunities and challenges facing fintech startups and established financial institutions alike.

By the end of the course, students will have a solid understanding of the basic areas in fintech, and will be equipped with the knowledge and tools to analyze and evaluate fintech innovations and their impact on the financial services industry.

Academic Prerequisites

To enroll in the course, students must have achieved the minimum grade of "C" in the Financial Management course.

Grading

- There will be 2 exams, each counting for 25% of your final grade. The exam will not be cumulative. (50%)
- There will be 5 homework assignments each counting for 4% of your final grade. (20%)
- Attendance is mandatory and participation is expected. But there will be 5 <u>random in-class</u> <u>quizzes</u> counting for 5% of your final grade. The quiz will have only 1 or 2 questions. You have to do them all correctly to earn points. (5%)
- The case study report will account for 10% of your final grade.
- The Final group presentation will account for 15% of your final grade.

Comments on Examinations and Report

- Exams will cover homework, exercises, and lecture notes consistent with the tentative class schedule. The format of the exams will be multiple-choice and will include conceptual (e.g., non-mathematic) issues as well as problem-solving and numeric manipulation.
- The homework and exercises assignments will serve as an excellent reference for the content, and structure of the exam questions. The level of difficulty for the exam questions will be slightly harder than homework questions. After all, the homework is supposed to provide exercises for you to fully understand lecture contexts. Exam questions are built up on homework and exercises. Sometimes take one more step to get to the correct answer.
- Students who are unable to attend a scheduled examination <u>must present the instructor</u> with documentation of a valid medical, family, or personal emergency before the <u>exam</u> to obtain permission for a make-up examination. In this circumstance, all make-up exams will be given at the earliest convenience. Students who fail to make up a missed examination, or fail to attend the scheduled final exam, will receive a score of zero for all missed work.
- The case study report should use analytical writing. The following general outline is useful: Research question statement, evidence, argument, limitations, and conclusion. The case study prepare you for an applied understanding of digital lending and payment in the real world.
- The final group presentation will be a mock roadshow of your AI fintech company. The presentation prepares you for an applied understanding of topics such as VC in fintech, AI and financial service, and new trends in fintech.
